

Near City Point Va.

May 11th. 1864

My Dear Emma,

I have no chance to write or send a letter, since I wrote Sunday, but the Chaplain is going to take letters to the Joint today, so I hope you will get this soon. We were relieved from picket Sunday night, and started the next morning at 4 o'clock on a march, and got back to camp again last night. We had a very hard tramp, and there was considerable fighting. Our loss was very small, and our reg^t did not have a man hurt, though we were hurried from one part of the field to another, all through the two days to another; all through the two days that it lasted, the enemy always made the attack at some other point. We went within two miles of Petersburg

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hurried from one part of the field,
to another, all through the two days
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the attack at some other point. We
went within two miles of Petersburg
destroying the railroad and the tele-

graph, but we did not get there till
about dark, and during the night
the enemy received heavy reinforcements^{to}
and there was an attack made on our
position here from Richmond, so we
had to hustle back, to drive them
from here. We have been within about
8 or 9 miles of Richmond, and are now
about 12 miles from there. You will
be likely to see the account of all this
in the papers, and will learn the par-
ticulars sooner than I shall. I have
no idea what the next move will
be, and do not care. We only know
when we are ordered to march. I would
give more for a letter from you now,
than anything else. I am hoping to
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more now, but you shall hear
from me as often as possible.

Good bye, darling. Write often.
